MKU Launches Research On Plant-Based Soap

Research towards production of plant-based black soap is currently at an advanced stage at the Mount Kenya University (MKU).

The initiative will see Aloe Vera and bamboo extracts used as additives to the soap, according to MKU Pro-Chancellor Dr Vincent Gaitho.

He said the university is conducting the research at its botanic garden at the Happy Valley campus in Thika that has over 300 indigenous plant species.

Dr Gaitho was speaking during the tree planting exercise by students and members of staff at the 103-acre land parcel adjacent to Thika River.

He was accompanied by the MKU Vice-Chancellor Prof Deogratius Jaganyi and Co-Founder Dr Jane Nyutu.

“During this rainy period, the University plans to plant and grow over 5000 indigenous trees, shrubs and herbs. The plants

will serve a triple purpose: mitigation of climate change, food security and improvement of people’s livelihoods,” Dr Gaitho stated, adding that the University has so far grown over 100,000 trees at different places.

Pro Jaganyi concurred that medicinal trees are not only a source of natural remedies but also play a pivotal role in maintaining the ecological balance of our surroundings.

“Mount Kenya University has always been a pioneer in promoting environmental consciousness, and the initiative to grow medicinal trees aligns seamlessly with our ethos,” asserted the VC.

“The biodiversity of provides a unique opportunity for us to cultivate a variety of medicinal trees, each with its own set of healing properties,

“Imagine a botanic garden adorned with the likes of Neem, Aloe Vera, Warbugia,

Moringa, Eucalyptus, and many other medicinal trees whose leaves, bark, and extracts have been revered for their therapeutic benefits for centuries,” said Prof Jaganyi.

Moreover, the scholar added, the cultivation of medicinal trees aligns with global efforts to preserve biodiversity and combat climate change.

“Trees are nature’s air purifiers, and by growing medicinal varieties, we not only contribute to a healthier environment but also create a living pharmacy that future generations can benefit from. This initiative also provides a unique learning opportunity for our students,” he pointed out.

The cultivation of medicinal trees at the University, he noted, is not just a practical step towards a healthier community, but a symbolic gesture of its commitment to the well-being of our planet.

Dr Nyutu on her part said MKU is currently the United Nations Academic Impact Hub for SDG 10 on Reduced Inequalities.

“Accordingly, MKU’s team of professionals, scholars and researchers, working in collaboration with practitioners and other persons of goodwill, have joined hands with the Government of Kenya and with all the other Kenyans as well as with the international community in climate mitigation through trees growing as evidenced today,

“Certainly when the ecosystem is fully restored, the challenges of recurrent droughts and floods will be solved thus contributing towards other SDGs including poverty eradication, creation of decent works, Reduced Inequalities and life below water besides others,” she said.

NEWS IN BRIEF



Kenya Tea Development Agency Chief Executive Officer Wilson Muthaura awarded a prize of KSh30,000 to Davis Tamba, who emerged the best in a story competition on tea. The awarding ceremony took place on Thursday evening at Alliance Franchise in Nairobi and saw the first runners up take home KSh20,000 while the second KShs10,000. Muthaura described Tea and Stories as “Thread of Shared Humanity”, pointing out that innovation is at the heart of KTDA’s corporate values. He indicated that his firm is open to partner on innovation ideas along its sustainability initiatives to improve the welfare of smallholder tea sector stakeholders. The competition attracted 67 entries.



The Principal Secretary of the State Department for Micro Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development, Susan Mang’eni, has called for collaborations between the Kenya Industrial Estate (KIE), Kenya Forest Service (KFS), and the county government of Uasin Gishu to establish tree nurseries in all primary schools across the county. The aim is to grow fruit trees for consumption, boosting children’s health. The KIE will work with primary school administrations to provide funds for the environmental clubs to plant trees, which the KIE will buy from them later. The money generated from the sale of seedlings will fund higher education for learners when they complete primary level. PS Mang’eni praised Uasin Gishu residents for using the Hustler fund to borrow for various businesses and repaying at a 77.5 percent rate.



Climate change is causing land degradation through drought, desertification, and other extreme weather conditions. The Institution of Surveyors of Kenya (ISK) President Eric Nyadimo highlighted the importance of surveying professionals understanding the impacts of climate change on their practice and helping the globe mitigate its effects. Surveyors play a crucial role in environmental impact assessments, mapping and monitoring land features, and land use planning. They help identify suitable areas for development, minimize environmental impact, and resolve boundary disputes, ensuring the protection of natural resources. The conference brought together land professionals from five African countries to discuss climate change issues.



A clinical trial has found evidence supporting the use of four new and improved regimens for treating multi-drug resistant tuberculosis (MDR/RR-TB) among children and adults. The trial discovered three new drug regimens that could deliver similar efficacy and safety to conventional treatments while reducing treatment time by up to two-thirds. These endTB regimens represent important alternatives for short MDR-TB treatment and complement the use of another highly effective, shorter MDR-TB regimen, called BPaLM, which is not suitable for certain populations. The trial also supports the use of a fourth regimen as an alternative for people who cannot tolerate bedaquiline or linezolid. Kenya was among eight countries that have reached a 35% reduction from 2015, with TB being a serious public health concern in the region. The WHO report notes that the gap between the estimated number of TB cases and the number of notified cases remains large, with gaps in recording the actual number of drug-resistant TB cases even larger.



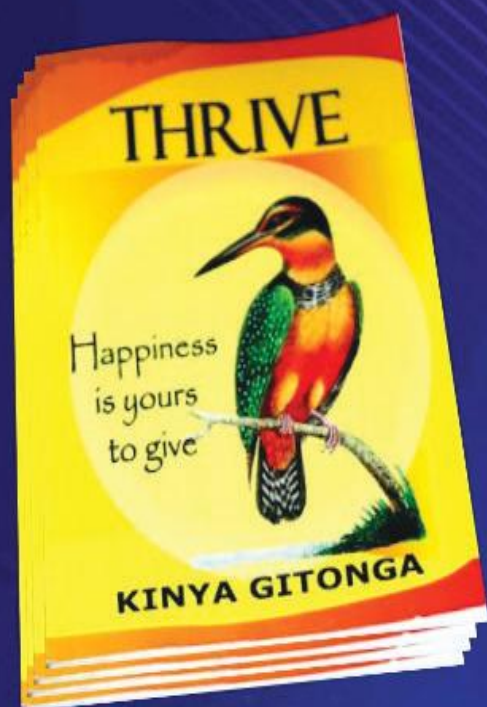

Rice is one of the most important foods in the global fight against hunger and is considered a priority value chain in the government’s Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) under the reduction of imports pillar. The Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organisation (KALRO) Director General Dr. Eliud Kireger aims to improve crop production, productivity, and utilization.

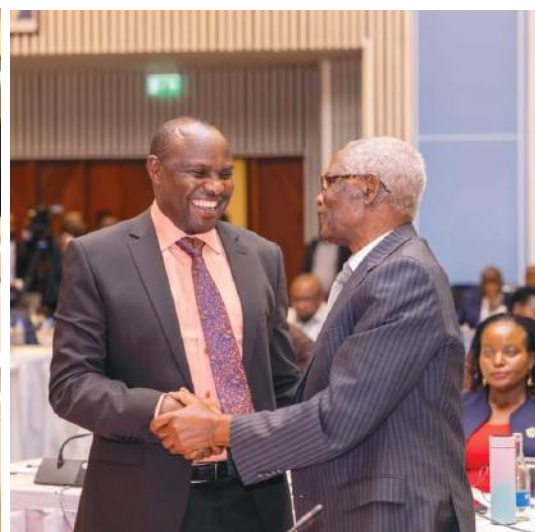
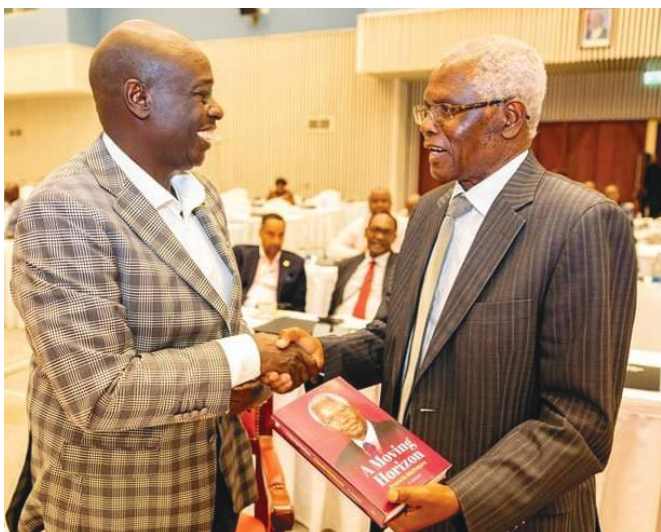

President William Ruto has said the Government is adopting new approaches to managing emerging security threats.

He said the Government is committed to enhancing the education of members of the security service to prepare them for the challenges of the modern world.

This investment, he noted, will focus on equipping security personnel with skills and knowledge to navigate contemporary security complexities.

He said security agencies will employ theoretically sound, evidence-based, data-driven, and innovative approaches to problem-solving.

“For a long time, the popular image of security or defense was of a sector that was not only deficient in education but had no time for ideas and certainly averse to higher learning,” he added.

He made the remarks on Friday during the inaugural graduation ceremony of the National Defence University of Kenya in Lanet, Nakuru County.

The President encouraged the graduates to elevate their skills by actively partnering with and seeking input from experts across diverse fields.

“This is how you build and sustain the capacity to prevail in the face of complex challenges,” he said.

The Head of State observed that the Government is implementing the Bottom Up Economic Transformation Agenda as a strategy to empower the people to keep them away from illegal practices that may lead to instability.

“We know that extreme poverty and stark inequality create fertile grounds for the recruitment of embittered and frustrated young people into various forms of lawlessness,” he said.

Ruto: Global South Must Push For More Inclusive World Order

President William Ruto has urged nations in the Global South to unite in addressing issues affecting the world.

He said the Global South must take advantage of the democratic character of multilateralism to push for meaningful changes.

President Ruto noted that it is time these nations stepped forward to safeguard their collective interests.

He cited fiscal measures taken by powerful economies, supply chain disruptions on account of conflicts, high-interest rates driving nations in debt distress as some of the main global issues affecting those in the Global South.

“These conditions have created an environment where millions of people are poor and unemployed, struggling against a global order that appears rigged against their aspirations,” he said.

He made the remarks on Friday during the second Voice of Global South Summit, which was conducted virtually.

The Head of State emphasised that collaborative efforts will empower the Global South to expedite its economic growth.

This, he explained, will transform it into the driving force of the next phase of the Industrial Revolution.

“The overdue economic renaissance of the Global South is held off by systematic marginalisation and exclusion from multilateral discourse in terms of effective participation and benefits,” he added.

President Ruto told the Heads of State and Governments at the Summit to use the upcoming COP28 to push for global climate action.

“It can no longer be business as usual when the people of the Global South are unfairly punished by extreme climate for the economic sins of others,” he added.

Prime Minister of India Narendra Modi and other leaders of the Global South were present.

Giving Should Be Joyous — “For God Loves A Cheerful Giver”

With the mental disciplines of giving firmly in mind, the way is ready for the act of giving. To begin with, the act of giving should be accompanied by offering oneself to the Lord, just as did the Macedonians who “gave themselves first to the Lord” (2 Corinthians 8:5). This should be done silently, not so someone will see our pious act of worship. And giving oneself to God is indeed worship (Romans 12:1). Second, it is strongly recommended, in light of the great giving requirements imposed on God’s ancient people Israel, that everyone should at least consider the first 10 percent as a starting point in giving — a minimum. And in the case of the Macedonians’ grace giv-

ing, the amount must have been way over 10 per cent because 10 percent of their “extreme poverty” (2 Corinthians 8:2) would not have helped anyone.

Third, your giving ought to be regular. Paul advised this same Corinthian church on another occasion, “On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made” (1 Corinthians 16:2). The apostle knew that regular, systematic giving would help the people meet their regular obligations and most emergencies. Fourth, you must begin giving now. The natural tendency is to put giving off until you feel able to give. Such thinking keeps many from ever giving.

Giving should not only be regular, but responsive to need, spontaneous, like that of the Macedonians and Mary of Bethany who in anointing Jesus so lavishly poured out her resources. High “Heaven rejects the lore Of nicely calculated less and



more.” Finally, your giving should be joyous — “for God loves a cheerful giver” (2 Corinthians 9:7). As we have been so often reminded, “cheerful” can be translated “hilarious,” suggesting a joy which leaps over all restraints. The act of giving is a blessed state. We do well to remember that our Lord Jesus Himself said, “It is more blessed to give than to receive” (Acts 20:35). May we be faithful and disciplined in giving ourselves and all we have to God!

Raila's Dossier On Fuel Imports Saga That Never Was

A few days ago, I listened to a speech made by the leader of the opposition outfit Azimio La Umoja One Kenya Coalition Raila Odinga at a public event in his backyard of Luo Nyanza.

He stated that he had dossier on the latest controversy surrounding the fuel imports saga and announced that he was going to drop the bombshell in coming week.

I will tell you the oil cartels, who were being protected by President Ruto, to raid public coffers and steal your taxes.

The so called government-to-government oil imports deal that Ruto signed with the governments of Saudi Arabia and United Arab Emirates (UAE) was nothing but a scam.

To me, I did not take him seriously. I knew he was just playing politics. Raila had previously been listed as a key player in the lucrative business of oil. Maybe, this time he had been left out.

This is not the first time he would threaten to release a dossier and when he makes good his threat it turns out to be a hot-air and political propaganda.

For instance, when the Supreme Court dismissed his petition challenging the election of President William Ruto he claimed a few days later that he had a dossier showing he had won the polls.

Many Kenyans interpreted this as cheap and narrow propaganda. They posed: Why did he fail to use this 'evidence' to bolster his petition? The law allowed him to file a new petition. Why did he fail to do so? It is noting he had resorted to the same game after losing the previous elections.

On oil saga, Raila repeated the same claims when he addressed a press conference in Nairobi.

When the media pressed him to produce evidence, he dodged the questions and instead added a new angle. He lamented that the cartels were not paying corporate tax and linked this to the depreciation of Kenya shilling. How did he expect Kenyans to buy his claims

without providing an iota of evidence?

The problem of currency depreciation is worldwide. It had been partly caused by the USA move to hike the interest of dollar.

For starters, Raila's family owns the East Africa Spectre International which specializes in the business of Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG).

Many believe that during eras of Presidents Moi, Kibaki and Uhuru, Raila took advantage of the political truces he signed with each to push a selfish course of his family's vast business interests.

Besides East Africa Spectre, the family owns the Molasses plant in Kisumu which was initially owned by the state.

They reportedly purchased the Plant at a throw away price during the Moi era. This after Raila ceded hardline stance and agreed to sign a political corporation agreement with Moi.

It is worth noting that Raila studied in Russia. It is therefore not surprising that his history is littered with all manners of propaganda, unsubstantiated claims and at a time outright lies.

I know here I'm putting myself on cross-fire with his fanatical and diehard supporters.

To them, Raila is a genuine whistle blower. He had previously exposed mega corruption scandals rocking the previous administrations including National Youth Service (NYS) and Eurobond saga.

One thing however remains clear. He always avoided cooperating with the anti-graft agencies to help them get to the bottom of the matter.

When you say so or so is a thief, the onus to prove the allegation squarely lies with you.

It is the same case with the government. The law requires you to submit evidence by way of recording a statement.

Whenever Raila was asked to do so, he always resorted to politicizing this matter.

Don't ask me to come and share the information I have. Take me to Kamiti Maximum Prison. I have been there for more than 100 times. I don't fear anything, he once dared the investigators.

This drama was witnessed during the reign of the first term of then President Uhuru Kenya. Dr William Ruto, the current President, was the deputy President.

Many Kenyans would later come to a conclusion. Raila never cared for us. He was just using us for his selfish and personal interests.

This is because he went mute after joining the Uhuru government through the 'handshake' arrangement.

With this, the NYS and Eurobond cases were not conclusively resolved. So it was hard to tell whether the scandals existed and if taxpayers' money was stolen, how much.

It is worth noting Raila had earlier played a similar card during the second term of President Mwai Kibaki.

Hell broke after he refused to accept results of the elections that have just been concluded. He claimed that Kibaki and his top aides had rigged him out in broad daylight.

This triggered political mayhem that claimed the lives of more than 1,000 Kenyans and caused destruction of properties worth billions of shillings.

After two months of violence, both Kibaki and Raila caved in to the mounting pressure from the international community. This heralded in birth of the grand coalition government of National Unity where they shared power equally.

Raila become contented and would rarely expose the ills associated with Kibaki regime. He would speak out whenever he smelt a rat that Kibaki's handlers and confidantes were plotting to bring him down.

But this would not take long. Mzee Kibaki new how to manage his anger and shepherd him back to the path of the government agenda.

For now, my position that Raila should be the last person to hit out at Ruto is further re-enforced by the following. When he was the Prime Minister, he was associated with a number of mega corruption scandals.

One of them was Sh78 billion oil Triton scandal. What had started as rumors that the prime suspect was his close friend came to pass when he was seen dining and winning with him. Then Energy Minister Kiraitu Murungi was among those present in what looked like a birthday or farewell party. The photos taken showed them toasting glasses of wine with the suspect.

First forward to the second term of President Uhuru Kenyatta, Raila managed to fight his way and occupied his seat on the high table.

This paved the way for the formation of the 'handshake' government. The high cost of fuel was one of the key challenges that stood in their way. While citing this as the main reason for high cost of living, majority of Kenyans started to distance themselves from their administration.

President Uhuru's twin interventions of introducing oil subsidy and signing government to-government deals with international oil suppliers did not help the matters.

The oil cartels ended up pocketing a huge chunk of billions of shillings allocated by The National Treasury. The interventions which were meant to ensure that there was enough supply and prices of petroleum products are lowered totally failed.

As a co-principal, Raila continued to defend and support these shoddy deals.

Reports at the time indicated that the cartels Comprised individuals who were known to be cronies, friends and close relatives of the duo.

Get me right. I'm not insinuating that two wrongs can make a right.

Just look at timing of Raila's latest claims. He spoke just two days after launching mass registration drive for new members of his Orange Democratic Movement (ODM).

During the ceremony that took place in his home county of Siaya, Raila hinted at running for President for sixth time in 2027.

With this, he had kicked the onslaught against President Ruto in earnest. One can therefore understand where the story of fuel scandal came from.

Let me repeat this again. I'm not sweeping his claims under the carpet. However, with due respect, my challenge is. He should be prepared to prove his claims beyond reasonable doubt. Stop it if you don't. This will save you from being embarrassed and ashamed.

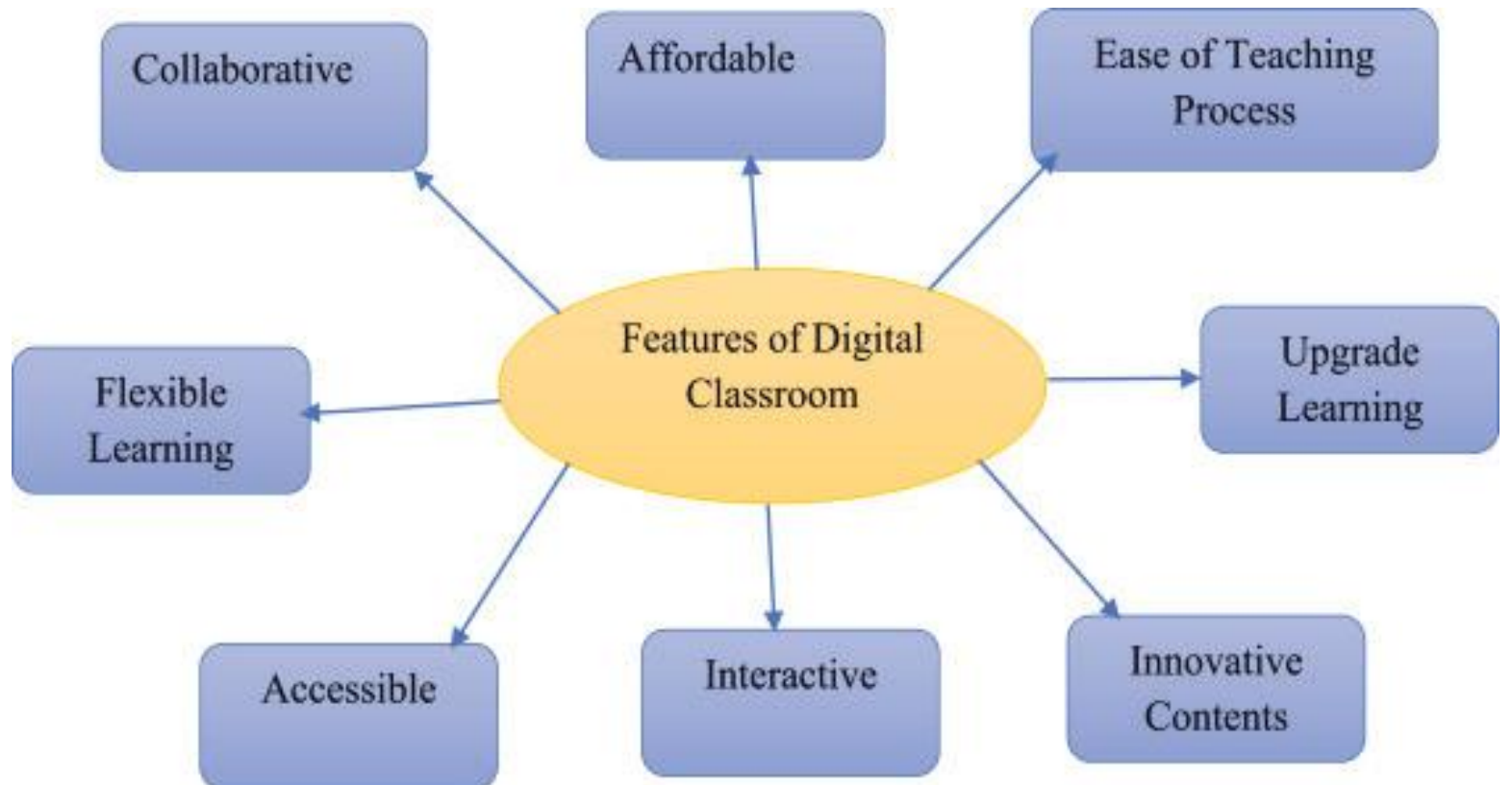

How can we get education to so many children who are not in schools or whose schools are inadequate and are scattered over vast distances in sometimes remote areas with little access? A lever regarding rampant illiteracy and innumeracy among large swaths of our world's children is the use of digital technology. The idea is that through laptops, tablets, smart phones and more, we can democratize education by giving those devices to disenfranchised children across the globe and teaching them, through appropriate applications, to be literate about the written word and numeracy. This has already been underway in several locations around the world. One example is One Laptop per Child (OLPC) which originated in the Media Lab at MIT. This non-profit organization has supplied inexpensive laptops to children around the world.

The most striking example of this is Uruguay which is saturated with laptops. All school-age children and their teachers have laptops. And that is currently being extended to Uruguay's elder citizens. For the first time in human history, a government decided to provide digital communication to all its youth. Some of these children live in remote parts of Uruguay where there is no electricity. Yet children from there

now have the possibility of being connected to other children and their teachers. This social experiment, on a large scale, can be envisioned for neglected school-age children around the world. It is with this in mind that another attempt is being made to bring literacy to disenfranchised children via digital technology comes from Maryanne Wolfe's work in Ethiopia as part of the Global Literacy Project (Wolf, this volume; Wolf, Gottwald, Galyean, Morris & Breazeal, 2013; Wolf, Gottwald, Galyean & Morris, 2013). She chose to work in two villages there in order to help foster literacy. In one of the villages, in a remote part of Ethiopia, none of its citizens is literate.

This means, of course, that there is no school there. Digital technology was brought to the village in the form of a tablet to see if the village's children could become literate when interacting with the technology Wolf and her colleagues introduced. The situation was set up so that every key stroke on the tablet was recorded and video cameras were set up to tape all events where the tablet was located. The tablet, placed in a strategic location in the village, had apps that were especially built to take into account, as much as possible, children's exposure to written language for the first time. For many important reasons, the written language was English. The thinking behind this ambitious project was that if illiterate children in a village of non-readers could become literate through the use

of digital technology, a case could be made for bringing such technology to other remote villages and towns around the globe with similar or less severe literacy problems.

For the moment, the results have been encouraging although success has not been complete. The encouraging, even incredible, findings are that some of the children, who prior to the introduction of the tablet had never seen a pencil, could sight-read some words. What is sight-reading? You may have noticed this with your toddler children or grandchildren. They can recognize their name. My name is Sidney and when I was age 3, I could recognize it, and I also knew that others' written names weren't mine. I sight-read. I recognized my name as a whole. What I hadn't yet known was that each of the letters represented a sound and that combinations of symbols created combinations of sounds that were a word. This leap, what Wolf calls the Helen Keller leap, is the one that has not yet happened for the Ethiopian children, and it is the one that is necessary for these village children to enter the world of print as literate people. Being literate goes beyond this, of course. We have to learn to decipher meanings, authors' intents, and much more

.Even graduate students at the Ph.D. level are still learning to decipher written texts. But the more advanced aspects of reading will be denied if the basic aspect of connecting symbols to sounds is unavailable. As mentioned, at present, the Helen

Keller leap has not yet happened with these children. That is where things stand now regarding the heroic project to foster literacy without teachers among children who live in places where there are no schools or where there are schools but they are woefully overcrowded and understaffed. In an attempt to find a digital solution to this leap, the X-Prize is holding an international competition to encourage teams to build apps that will enable these village children and eventually hundreds of millions of children to enter the world of literacy. Underlying these efforts is the understanding, based on research and plain observation, that someone who has deciphered the symbol-sound code by her/himself is a rarity. A teacher is needed for that to happen. In lieu of situations where there are no schools or overcrowded classes, digital technology is being developed to do the teaching. The jury is out about whether or not it can be done. If it can, all of us gain.

I suggest that there is another lever that can bring teaching to disenfranchised and neglected children: children. No, this is not a typographical error. Children can teach children. Indeed, they do that naturally and spontaneously all the time from an early age. They are natural-born teachers. They do not need teacher training courses nor do they need to be licensed to be teachers. They teach, and do so at a remarkably early age. They have learned how to teach as part of their cognitive, emotional.

Marginalized Ethnic Groups Called To Apply For State Jobs And Avoid Blames

Three state owned institutions including Kenya Broadcasting Corporation (KBC), National Construction Authority and National Drought Authority were yesterday turned back by the National Assembly committee on national cohesion and equal opportunity, v. 1q for presenting documents that had no signatures from the accounting officers who are CEOs.

According to the committee Chair Hajji Yusuf MP for Mandera East the documents were not authentic due to parliamentary procedure that requires document ownership through signatures from the executive officer of an institution.

“Parliament requires that documents tabled in front of a committee must be signed, since the house is a house of records and integrity

we therefore require the accounting officer to own the document tabled here, due the fact that the committee

has the powers on issuing a ruling same to a Judiciary court” Stated Hon Hajji.

Among the issues the committee were interrogating is on equality in matters of employment especially Youth, women and people living with disabilities (PWDs), Ethnicity distribution on government space and Procuring of tenders for the specialized group.

Nyeri Town Member of Parliament Duncan Mathege disputed claims that only two tribes are the ones who have benefited from the National Share on employment and tenders by quoting the National Cohesion Act 2012 that says no organization in the country can have more 30% share give to one ethnic community.

“The Issue that the Kenya Kwanza Government has only offered job opportunities to one or two communities is hot air and I would refer my friends from opposition putting allegations to go to court of law or have a session with the National integration commission or amend the current laws on National cohesion which can be done at the National

Assembly where the opposition are still members” Said Hon Mathege MP Nyeri Town.

However the procurement Laws calls for Women Youth and People living disability to be given 30% of tender issuance, a matter which according to head of KPLC most people in the said group don’t apply since the requirements call for intense engineering skills. And on Employment most ethnic groups especially with the least number of representations don’t apply for position a matter that has pushed for sensitization especially to the marginalized groups

Kajiado North MP Onesmus Ngogoyo requested the Kenya power CEO who appeared at the committee to table the list of KPLC employees which has sparked a lot of questions from the public and workers whom have been working as casual workers for more than 6 years.

IG, DCI Boss Summoned Over Abduction Of Nairobi County Employee

The Inspector General of Police Japheth Koome and the Director of Criminal Investigation Mohamed Amin have been summoned to appear in court physically on Monday 20th November 2023 over the alleged abduction of a Nairobi county employee.

Justice Chacha Mwita ordered the two to appear in court and explain the whereabouts of Osman Khalif a personal assistant to Nairobi County Governor Johnson Sakaja who is said to have been kidnapped at Sarit Centre on Friday 10th November 2023.

The Judge’s orders came after Law Society of Kenya President Eric Theuri, lawyers Dancun Okatch and Oringo Waswa representing Osman Khalif informed the Judge that the

orders issued by the court seeking to have him or his abductors brought to court have not been complied with.

Justice Mwita has also ordered Safaricom PLC limited to produce car tracking records of abductors’ vehicle.

According to the LSK, Osman who is an employee of Nairobi County was abducted a week ago while in the company of his wife who was left at the parking at Sarit Centre in Nairobi.

Elsewhere, eight fraudsters have been arraigned in court for attempting to defraud Omid Kharkhaneh of 36000 US dollars (Ksh 5.4 million) on the pretence they would facilitate the transfer of 4 trillion US dollars.

The eight were also found with possession of three military boots, two jungle green trousers, two military jacket, two Angola shorts resembling Administration Police Service uniform, without written authority from Inspector General of Police.

Focus tells the story of Mark, a budding young man who works for an enterprise facilitating financial pay across Africa. Caught up in his world and nonchalant about happen-

ings around him, he soon experiences first-hand the dark side of internet shutdowns, censorship, surveillance, and cyberattacks. He learns the benefit of advocating for others, regardless of personal interest in their cause. The short film is inspired by the 2020 Londa report.

Based on the findings of the Londa 2022 report, Finding Diana is about Aisha Cooker, a 28-year-old journalist who stumbled upon a collection of personal data belonging to millions of citizens, including a governor she is investigating. In her quest for a better society, Aisha exposes the official, a move that puts her life in danger.

Screened at various events and platforms, PIN's short films have received extensive feedback from viewers and critics alike, who have cited the creativity, relevance, and impact they possess. The short films have also received multiple accolades and awards, with the latest being a Bronze recognition for Finding Diana at the 2023 Summit Creative Awards.

Bar Owners Protests Proposed Alcoholic Bill

The Bar Hotels & Liquor Traders Association Of Kenya (BAHLITA) has raised the alarm over several amendment bills being introduced in counties that they say will kill the alcoholic beverages sector and harm the hospitality sector as a whole.

Addressing members of the press through a joint statement at a Nairobi hotel the lobby group noted that Alcoholic Drinks Control Bills introduced in the county assemblies like Nyeri and Meru so far would negatively affect the sector.

The Bill in Nyeri is titled, The Nyeri County Alcoholic Drinks Control Bill, 2023 and is now undergoing public participation. A similar Bill is set to be introduced in the Meru County Assembly the statement reads.

Both bills are based on a model Bill developed with the backing of Deputy President Rigathi Gachagua, who has been leading the fight against alcoholism in Kenya, with a focus on the Mt Kenya region.

Bar operators however argued that the proposed law is overzealous and overreaching and will kill rather than

control a sector that employs thousands of people in the country.

They pointed out that proposed ban on transportation of alcohol using boda-bodas, transportation at night and the further restriction on bar opening times as amounting to an onslaught on the sector.

The bar owners have also vowed to go to court to protest against the

Nairobi County Government's move to double the license fees to sell alcohol in the capital city introduced via the 2023 Finance Act assented to by Governor Johnson Sakaja.

The lobby group (Bahlita) argues that the majority of the contentious provisions in the county bills run counter to the existing Alcoholic Drinks Control Act at the national

level popularly known as the Mututho Law.

"We have been angered by Sakaja here in Nairobi because of the increase in license fee despite the public participation. The result will be an increase in the consumption of illicit alcohol because of the restrictions on formal alcohol, and this leads to loss of jobs," said Bahlita

secretary Boniface Gachoka.

Bahlita said it was apprehensive that public participation in the counties could be used to meet the requirement on paper without any real impact on the proposed law.

The bills seek to restrict the sale of alcohol to take home, introduce alcohol-free zones, and restrict the sale of alcohol by wines and spirits shops outside designated areas and in hotels. They also seek to bar the sale of alcohol to "intoxicated persons" but the operators and other players argue that the provision is vague as judging whether a person is intoxicated is not accurate.

The bills also seek to ban advertising of alcohol by painting or decorating buildings on the outside as well as on digital or mobile platforms, both of which are common in the alcoholic beverages sector.

It would also restrict alcohol sales by supermarkets to between 5 pm and 9 pm and in hotels and lodgings and members' clubs to between 1 pm and 11 pm.

Distributors would also be restricted to making their deliveries to bars between 9 am and 6 pm and will be required to establish depots in every sub-county they are licensed to distribute.

Businesswoman Ann Njeri To Face MPs Over Sh17bn Oil Saga

The Departmental Committee on Energy in the National Assembly has summoned businesswoman Ann Njeri Njoroge to appear before it on November 22, 2023, to provide further information on the Sh17 billion oil saga.

The committee wants Njeri to, among other things, furnish details about ownership, including documentation proving that she is the legitimate owner of the 100,000 metric consignment.

Njeri, represented by her lawyer Cliffee Ombeta, has since confirmed her intention to attend the hearing while maintaining that the consign-

ment belongs to her.

Both Njeri and the Ministry of Energy have staked a claim to the consignment, and the upcoming parliamentary hearing is expected to unveil more details regarding the still puzzling mystery.

Energy Cabinet Secretary Davis Chirchir and the Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) have revealed that Ann is not the true owner of the oil consignment, alleging she used forged documents to assert ownership.

"The consignees and their respective portions of the bulk cargo are listed in the Manifest submitted by the Ship's Agent and KPA confirms that M/s Ann's Import and Export Enterprises Limited is not one of the manifested consignees," KPA Board Chairman Benjamin Tayari said.

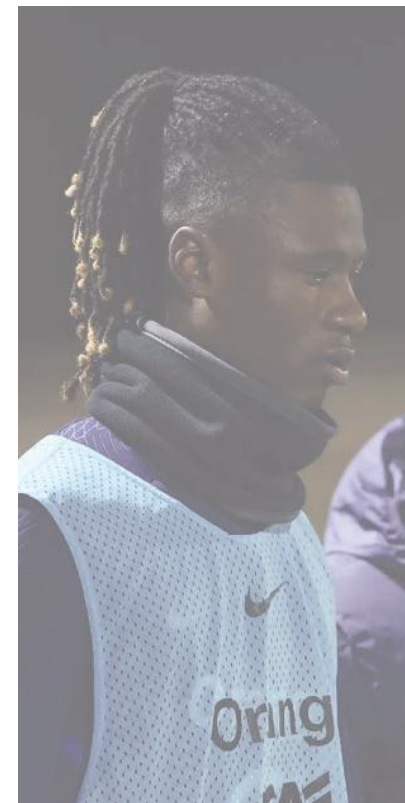

Everton have been docked 10 points after breaching Premier League financial rules, the English top flight announced on Friday.

The league referred Everton to an independent commission in March for an alleged breach of its profitability and sustainability rules (PSRs).

Clubs are allowed to lose a maximum £105 million (\$130 million)

over a three-year period or face sanctions.

The punishment, the biggest sporting sanction in the competition's history, leaves Everton 19th in the table.

The Premier League said in a statement: "The club admitted it was in breach of the PSRs for the period ending season 2021/22 but the extent of the breach remained in dispute.

"Following a five-day hearing

last month, the commission determined that Everton FC's PSR calculation for the relevant period resulted in a loss of £124.5 million, as contended by the Premier League, which exceeded the threshold of £105 million permitted under the PSRs.

"The commission concluded that a sporting sanction in the form of a 10-point deduction should be imposed. That sanction has immediate effect."

Everton issued a statement saying they were "shocked and disappointed by the ruling", announcing their intention to appeal.
